Parent teacher night interviews




Year 7 and Year 9 parent teacher interviews are on the Wednesday 21st July (2nd week back in Term 3).

Student attendance

Improving student attendance is a target area for all NSW public schools. At Bossley Park High School I would like all students to have their attendance at 95%-100%. My personal target for students is 98%, that is, between 1-4 days absent from school over the whole year.

I have attached the, 'Everyday Counts' poster, which shows the percentage absence and what it equals in the number of days absent. It also describes the impact absence from school has on student learning. It is extremely important for all students to be in a good routine and attend school on time everyday. Generally, students are sick only occasionally and their absence from school needs to be explained or supported with a medical certificate for longer absence. Parents can check their child's attendance on SENTRAL parent portal





E-cigarettes and voung people

What is an electronic cigarette?

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes are battery-operated devices that heat a liquid (or e-liquid) to produce a vapour to inhale. Using an e-cigarette is sometimes called 'vaping'. E-liquid contains a range of chemicals or flavours, and often contains nicotine. E-cigarettes with nicotine are illegal in NSW.

E-cigarettes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks. Vapour from e-cigarettes does not usually have a strong odour but they may have a sweet smell depending on the flavour.

What are the health risks for young people using e-cigarettes?

E-cigarettes can contain high levels of nicotine. Adolescence is a critical period for brain development and exposure to nicotine can have long-term health consequences, impacting memory, attention and learning. E-cigarettes are often labelled incorrectly and can contain nicotine, even when they claim not to. Nicotine is highly addictive and research suggests that young people can become more easily addicted to nicotine than adults. Research also indicates that young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to go on to

use regular cigarettes. E-cigarettes that do not contain nicotine are still not safe and can have negative, long-lasting health outcomes for young people. Vapours can contain the following: cancer-causing agents; toxins; heavy metals; and very fine particles that can cause adverse health effects.

Although e-cigarette packaging can list some ingredients, it may not include all chemicals in the vapour and researchers have found that toxic metals from e-cigarettes may be released into the vapour when inhaled.

E-cigarettes are often available in different flavours, which can be appealing to young people. While some chemicals in e-liquid are also used in food production and are generally considered safe when eaten, this does not mean they are safe when they are inhaled directly into the lungs.

Selling e-cigarettes to a person under 18 years of age is illegal

Just like tobacco products, selling any e-cigarette or e-cigarette accessories to people under 18 years of age is illegal in NSW, regardless of whether the product contains nicotine or not. If you suspect someone is selling e-cigarettes to minors, you can report it to NSW Health by completing the online reporting form or call the Tobacco Information Line on 1800 357 412.

What can you do as a parent or caregiver?

There are ways you can help protect your children from e-cigarettes as a parent or caregiver:

- Talk to your teenager about why e-cigarettes are harmful for them. It is never too late to have the conversation
- Learn about the different types of e-cigarettes available and the risks associated with using these products
- Set a good example by being tobacco free
- Report those who are selling e-cigarettes to minors or selling e-cigarettes containing nicotine. You can do this by completing by completing the online reporting form or calling the Tobacco Information Line on 1800 357 412.

Nicotine poisoning

Too much nicotine from e-cigarettes can cause nicotine poisoning. If you think someone has been poisoned by liquid nicotine, please call the Poisons Centre on 13 11 26 immediately or 000 if it is an emergency. For more information see NSW Poisons Information Centre

Congratulations to Year 7 who completed NAPLAN examinations in Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy this month. The Examinations were completed online over six days from the 11th to the 18th of May, with exams ranging from 42 to 65 minutes in length. It was extremely pleasing to see a high level of engagement from Year 7 during these examinations, with students applying their best effort to demonstrate the growth in their learning that they have achieved over the past two years.

Year 7 have also recently undergone a period of assessment, which will culminate in reports being generated and ready for distribution in week 10 of this term. Parents will receive access to these reports via an email and also through the parent portal. If parents are yet to access the portal and are experiencing difficulty accessing the portal please email the school and Mr Bennet the school's IT Coordinator will provide you with log in details and instructions regarding portal access.



Recently I spoke to Year 7 at a Year meeting regarding the use of social media, as there have been a few issues and concerns around these platforms. One of the things that I communicated to students was that all social media platforms have an age restriction of 13+ and that many of the students in Year 7 are actually in breach of this guideline by having an account. Although, ultimately with parental consent accounts can be established for children under 13.

However, cyber experts, in accordance with the Office of the e-Safety Commissioner, advise mums and dads to think carefully about questions like these before allowing any under-age child to open a social media account:

- Is your child resilient enough to handle negative online experiences like cyberbullying, drama and abuse?
- Does s/he understand the importance of privacy and how to protect it online?
- Does s/he understand how to share safely?
- Does s/he know how to report abuse behaviour online? (You can find direct reporting links for social media in the eSafety Guide.)
- Is s/he happy for you to establish rules and boundaries and to monitor use?
- Have you talked to her/him about online pornography?
- Have you talked to her/him about racism and other forms of hate speech online?
- Have you provided good mentoring and role modelling for social media use specifically and device use generally?

Another aspect of social media that I communicated to students was the parent test, which is that if a post, image or video would not be something that their parents would be approving of then this content is not appropriate and it shouldn't be posted or shared. I encourage all parents to have conversations with their children regarding social media and to regularly supervise the content that their children are posting and receiving through social media.



Earlier in the Term, Year 11 received their Semester 1 reports. (Reports are accessible through the Parent and Student Sentral Portals) It was pleasing to see so many students achieve quality reports. It is the school's aim to have every student demonstrate improvement every semester. Consequently, I encourage all students to read the suggested strategies for improvement for each of their courses within their report and for them to utilise these strategies to assist their attainment of improved outcomes.

Coinciding with the distribution of Year 11 reports Parent Teacher Evening took place on Wednesday 19th of May and it was great to see so many parents back in the school for face to face interviews and conversations with teachers. The evening was an excellent opportunity for parents to meet teachers and obtain a more comprehensive understanding of their child's performance to date and the strategies they can use to support them in achieving the best possible results they are capable of. Thank you to all parents who attended on the night and for parents who were unable to attend please don't hesitate to contact teachers to obtain further information about your child.



Year 11 are about to enter another period of assessment prior to the end of the Term, with a substantial number of assessment tasks being completed in Weeks 8-10 of this term. I encourage all Year 11 students to plan and prepare thoroughly for these tasks to ensure they are able to demonstrate an extensive knowledge and understanding of course outcomes. Students must also ensure they refer to the Year 11 Assessment Booklet and devise a study plan for upcoming tasks. Students who are unable to sit assessment tasks or submit them by the due date, must ensure they refer to the Assessment Booklet to access the Illness and Misadventure Policy, which must be followed to ensure consideration for these tasks.

This Term also saw the commencement of the Fast Forward program, which is a program run by Western Sydney University that supports students who are aspiring to enter into University at the conclusion of the HSC. This Year there are 22 Year 11 students involved in the program. These students will participate in one on one consultations with a University consultant about career options and University pathways. The participants will also have access to studiosity, which is an online tutoring program that is designed to assist students with assignments, exam preparation and course work. Participants also have the opportunity to apply for a \$20 000 scholarship with WSU, which is only open to Fast Forward Program participants.






Deputy's Desk

Please remind your child the importance of being a SRL which includes: correct uniform (jumpers/jackets, shoes, PE clothes), no mobile phone use at school, speaking with staff and students respectfully, being an engaged learner in the classroom and displaying safe behaviour in the playground. Students must be responsible for their actions and decisions both good and bad. I ask that you work with the school on this issue with your child.

A Year 9 Wellbeing Day is being planned for later in the year. This will consist of several indoor and outdoor activities which will focus on the student's mental, social and physical health. Thanks you to the Year Advisers and HT Wellbeing (Ms Dundovic, Mr Gubert and Ms Melville) for putting this day together. Stay tuned for more details to come. Finally, we welcome Mr Gubert to the Year 9 team as Year Adviser. With Ms Debono leaving recently to take up a position at another school it is fantastic to have Mr Gubert on board. I see having a male and female Year Adviser as a positive move so to widen our ability to cater for issued across girls and boys.

Year 10 will be starting the process of Subject Selections towards the end of this Term. This year we will have a whole website available as a one stop shop to answer all your questions. The link to the website will be sent out to all parents and students via email in Week 10 this Term.

That means you have the whole two week holiday break to have a look through it together with your child, watch all the subject video's and write down any further questions you or your child may have.

We will be asking students to select 6 Subjects plus reserves, also to let us know if they intend to be eligible for an ATAR (University entrance rank), or if they intend to transition to TAFE or employment or do a combination of options.

We have a few new Vocational Education Courses (VET) available next year which can be studied here at school, but through online delivery. Which means students will report to the library and work independently under teacher supervision. These courses do contain mandatory work placement each year to get a hands on experience. They are considered Category B courses which means only 1 can count towards your ATAR, and we would advise students to do no more than 2 VET courses.

Parent teacher night is also coming up for Year 10 at the end of this Term, I do hope to see lots of parents engage with this, it's a great time to ask teachers questions about subject or pathways for your child next year.


Safe, respectful online behaviour



As we progress further into the year, students are starting to forget the safe, respectful learner behaviour online. Our SRL behaviours are encouraged in all learning areas including classrooms, oval, library, corridors and online.

Tell your kids that it's important to:

- **Be nice.** Mean behaviour is not OK. Make it clear that you expect your kids to treat others with respect, and to never post hurtful or embarrassing messages. And ask them to always tell you about any harassing or bullying messages that others post.
- Think twice before hitting "enter." Remind teens that what they post can be used against them. For example, letting the world know that you're off on vacation or posting your home address gives would-be robbers a chance to strike. Teens also should avoid posting specific locations of parties or events, as well as phone numbers.
- Follow the "WWGS?" (What Would Grandma Say?) rule. Teach kids not to share anything on social media that they wouldn't want their teachers, future bosses and yes, grandma to see. Students have also been reminded- would you want your Deputy, your Year Advisers, or Mrs Chevell seeing these messages?
- **Use privacy settings.** Privacy settings are important. Go through them together to make sure your kids understand each one. Also, explain that passwords are there to protect them against things like identity theft. They should never share them with anyone, even a boyfriend, girlfriend, or best friend.
- Don't "friend" strangers. "If you don't know them, don't friend them." This is a plain, simple and safe rule of thumb.


Oz Harvest fruit deliveries



In honour of Reconciliation Week in our library we set up a display of literature and art to commemorate Aboriginal History.



'FOCUS – Female Leaders' program with ABCN (Australian Business Community Network)

During Term 2, selected female students from Year 10 and 11 were nominated by their Year Adviser's to participate in the Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN) Program. The ABCN's programs are developed to provide opportunities for students to learn about different industries and vocational options, and to develop the skills for life after school. In consultation with principals and the Department of Education and Training, it was agreed that this could be achieved through structured group programs that involved business professionals mentoring students, with the aim to raise awareness of the wider range of personal, educational and vocational choices.

The mentors and students met online via a digital program which started on 20th May 2021 and will continue till 10th June 2021. The mentors are volunteers from ABCN's member organisations or their affiliates and they want to help young people understand what options are available to them after school.

During the program sessions, mentors and student have individual discussions, complete joint activities, participate in broader group discussions on issues such as goal setting, communication and interview skills, and finally present their work or findings to the group.

The students are participating in the Focus and Empower Programs. The Focus program aims to provide young women with the essential leadership skills they need to engage in a successful, meaningful career. The initiative addresses the underrepresentation of women in senior roles in Australia. It is designed to support young women to develop their leadership skills, aspire to senior roles in business and the community, and foster a sense of self-belief that will encourage them to aim high.







The ABCN program has pushed me outside my comfort zone. It has stretched my idea of what I thought was possible. The mentors have reassured me that failures and setbacks are just stepping stones to success. It teaches us resilience and problem solving. Ultimately, ABCN has given me the confidence to try new things, to strive to be better, to set goals and achieve them.'- Eran Moffat, Year 11

The Empower program is designed to equip students with the confidence, behaviours and mindsets needed to prepare for the rapidly changing world of work. During the program, delivered 20th May, the mentors shared their own career journeys and challenges, 'fabulous failures' and strategies to encourage students to consider their options for the future.

Pre Apprenticeship Automotive course:

Bossley Park High School is lucky to be an Educational Pathways Pilot Program (EPPP) school. Thanks to the new EPPP initiative, "Fee free 'test and try' VET subjects for high school students," a select group of students were able to embark on pre-apprenticeship and pre-traineeship courses through one of seven Group Training Organisations (GTO) that have partnered with the EPPP.

After the selection process, the students were required to attend an interview with My Gateway, and upon successful selection at interview level were then invited to attend an information session to participate in an induction. Upon successful completion of the course, students completed between two and four Units of Competency with a Smart and Skilled training providers and they also gained valuable industry experience and contact with a local employer, brokered by the GTO. And best of all, they are able to put their accredited training towards further study, fast tracking their vocational training.

Three selected students geared up to start an intensive Pre-Apprenticeship Skills in Automotive course, which was delivered at the TAFE NSW Wetherill Park campus. The course was a great learning opportunity for the students and, a real eye opener. The course allowed students to gain hands on experience relating to the world of Automotive and the life

of an Apprentice. Open to all NSW public schools, the Game Changer Challenge is a student-led, dualstream design thinking challenge that asks students to tackle real-world problems and explore innovative solutions.

Over the course of three weeks, students in Year 7 to 10, alongside Mrs Grujovski and Miss Yalda, participated in the 2021 Game Changer Challenge. The Game Changer Challenge allows students to work together and introduces them to the design thinking process and real world problems. Congratulations to our Zone Cross Country team, despite the weather, our students represented our school with pride and dignity.



During Reconciliation Week in History we aim to recognise the actions towards Indigenous people made in the past that were wrong, and to understand that the journey of reconciliation is ongoing.



AdobeSpark Presentation by Adam Kamenjasevic - Year 10








7J Explore Life in Ancient Egypt!

No knives at school – parent factsheet

Health and Safety Directorate



There is no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances

If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.

The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or looker. Having a knife for self-proteotion is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.

Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including gool sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for a child to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

As school policy is designed to keep all students safe, no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or truit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives and star knives are all prohibited.

Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).

In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools. There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives.

Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife. They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.

Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.

It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old
